

From the Chair

2009 was a significant year of change and development for Regional Arts NSW.

The primary focus of RANSW's advocacy was to seek an increase in the funding provided by the NSW State Government, as partners with local government, in support of the thirteen Regional Arts Boards across the state. The amount sought for each Board was an additional \$35,000 per annum, to bring the State's annual contribution to \$120,000 to each Board. While we were not successful in achieving the full amount, in October the Minister for the Arts announced an increase of \$15,000 per annum for each of the Boards, bringing the state contribution to \$100,000. This additional funding will assist in increasing the capacity of the Regional Arts Boards to respond to the growing demands of their regions.

As the outcomes being achieved by each of the Regional Arts Boards continue to have significant benefits for regional communities, advocacy will continue in the coming year to further advance the financial contribution by the state government. Core funding for Regional Arts NSW moved from being subject to annual application, to being allocated triennially as a peak organisation representing the interests of Regional Arts Boards at a state and national level. The Country Arts Support Scheme (CASP) received an additional one off amount of \$45,000 to supplement the grants administered by RANSW to local arts organisations across the state.

Major changes occurred in the structure of RANSW during the year. In the early part of the year the Board undertook a major review of its efficacy, as a representative Board of sixteen members. Among the issues addressed were the financial constraints of the organisation in bringing the Board together more than three times per year, which was considered insufficient for effective governance; the frequent turnover of Board members appointed by the Regional Arts Boards; the difficulties encountered in maintaining a spread of skills and knowledge on the Board.

The Regional Arts NSW Constitution was extensively revised to reflect a new structure. As the Regional Arts Boards became the members of the organisation, an Advisory Council comprising the Chairs of each Regional Arts Board (or their nominee) was established. A nine member skills based Board comprising a minimum of five regional members, plus four co-opted positions to ensure a spread of the required skills, was established and commenced operation on 2 July 2009. To ensure continuity and smooth transition the five regional directors' positions became two year appointments, with two Board members standing down at the first AGM to create an alternating completion of terms. The new Board took office on 2 July 2009 and has been working well since that time.

I would like to thank the members of two Boards that were in office during 2009 for their contribution to what has been an unusually demanding situation. The initial Board had the future welfare of Regional Arts NSW firmly in mind and scrupulously examined the options considered in the review. I appreciate the contribution of the Deputy Chairman, Cr Phillip Silver, and all other Board members for their input into what has turned a rather unwieldy structure into one that is better suited to carry on the business of Regional Arts NSW. The new Board has been working very well since July, 2009. Their commitment and enthusiasm for progressing the arts in the regions is very much appreciated.

The outline of operations in this document shows how Regional Arts NSW is punching well above its weight and proving to be a valuable and respected organisation. I thank Elizabeth Rogers for her leadership, professionalism and commitment to the arts in regional NSW. Again, she has travelled widely in the regions and has continued to manage the organisation and represent its interests to a wide range of stakeholders and funding bodies. She has led the small band of staff to achieve excellent and timely services to the Regional Arts Boards across the state. The organisation is indeed fortunate to have this team of people working for regional and rural communities in NSW.

From the CEO

Each year when I sit down to prepare the annual report and reflect over the past year it surprises me that our small team has been able to achieve so much in meeting our Strategic Objectives. This could not happen without the hard work and dedication of the staff combined with the support of the Chair, the Board and the collaboration with the network of Regional Arts Development Officers. It is this support and commitment that gives us the ability to deliver our goals and act effectively as a peak body and service agency for arts and cultural development in regional NSW. It's all about the people.

We had only one staff change in 2009. Our popular Administration Officer, Kate Reynolds moved on to further her career and we were most fortunate to be joined by Elinor Heard who took up the role in June. The position has been expanded to include some of our marketing functions and Elinor is managing the e-bulletin and the web site as well as the administration of the office. We were also delighted to have Ruben Allas join us as Research Officer, initially on contract to undertake research to identify economically sustainable Indigenous arts ventures in NSW funded by DEEWR, and later to determine training needs for Indigenous visual artists in NSW funded by Arts NSW.

We farewelled a number of long serving RADOs from the network during the year, Hannah Semler from Arts OutWest (AOW), Angela Sidoti from Out Back Arts (OBA), Nina O'Brien-Hehir from South West Arts (SWA) and previously Orana Arts and after 13 years in the position, Jack Ritchie from Arts North West (ANW). We welcome Tracey Callinan (AOW), Alyce Fisher (SWA), Jamie-Lea Hodges (OBA) and Jane Kreis (ANW) and look forward to working with them in the years to come.

Our multi-year agreements with our funding bodies have now been implemented and provide a greater degree of certainty for the delivery of our programs. We welcomed the NSW Government's announcement of an additional \$15,000pa for each board for the next triennium as well as additional funds for the Country Arts Support Program for 2010.

I would also like to acknowledge the importance of the funding programs that we manage on behalf of Arts NSW (CASP) and DEWHA (Regional Arts Fund) as these programs directly support artists and arts organisations in regional areas. My thanks to the assessment panels for both funds who have to make the difficult decisions as to which projects get funded and those that are unsuccessful and to Annette Eassie and Ben Sibson who administer the programs. We continue to advocate for an increase in the total grant pool to try to meet the demand.

Thanks also to our diligent Finance Manager, Palmarita D'Orazio who keeps an eagle eye on our complex financial and insurance matters and shares her expertise with the regional staff.

Regional travel was a major feature of this year. As well as week-long field trips to Arts Northern Rivers, Arts North West and Arts OutWest I completed an earlier familiarisation trip with Orana Arts and visited all other regions in the course of the year meeting with artists, arts organisations, local government personnel and local state and federal MPs. I would like to thank everyone that I met over the course of the year for their hospitality, their time and the information they shared with me. Annette and Ben also spent time in the regions delivering funding workshops and Ruben travelled extensively meeting Aboriginal artists and arts organisations while undertaking his research projects.

Finally my thanks to those government agencies who fund us, Arts NSW, DEWHA and the Australia Council, to deliver services specifically for the regional, rural and remote communities of NSW.

State Government

State Government Budget Bid

RANSW continued to advocate with all levels of government throughout the year. A budget bid was submitted to the then NSW Premier and Minister for the Arts, Nathan Rees requesting

- 1. Increased funding of \$35,000 per region for an additional part time staff member for each regional arts board.
- 2. Increased funding for the Country Arts Support program to bring the grant pool up to \$300,000 across the state.
- 3. Provision be made for funding two additional regional arts boards to complete the state coverage
- 4. That triennial grants be indexed by the CPI.

The submission was followed up by a round of meetings with MPs and advisors on both sides of the House by the Chair and the CEO with a request for bi-partisan support for the submission. These meetings were augmented by meetings with local MPs during regional field trips.

The submission was partially successful with an increase of \$15,000 per annum for each of the Regional Arts Boards announced in the budget and an additional one-off amount of \$45,000 for the CASP announced mid-year.

NSW Parliamentary Inquiry on Arts and Cultural Infrastructure Outside the Sydney CBD.

The Chair and CEO were called to appear before the Public Works Committee conducting the Inquiry into Arts and Cultural Infrastructure outside the Sydney CBD following our written submission in 2008. Subsequently we enabled the Sydney Morning Herald to run a story with support from Arts OutWest and the Conservatorium of Music in Lithgow.

- CEO accepted appointment to the grants assessment panels for capital project applications and the Regional Conservatoriums assessment panels.
- Responded through interview to the Museums and Galleries NSW review.

Attended and participated in the State Plan Stakeholder Forum at Parliament House

Other State agencies and peak bodies

RANSW continues to develop strategic relationships with other state agencies and peak bodies with a regional remit. Tourism NSW provided advice and support with the development of the TQUAL grant application, Crafting Regional Growth workshops; Events NSW through representation on their Regional Events Group and presentation to the July RADO meeting; Dept of State and Regional Development through assistance with developing the Arts Northern Rivers Artists' Speed-Dating project for delivery in other regions, support for the Country and Regional Living Expo and presentation on the Creative Industries strategy at the July RADO meeting.

RANSW continued to engage with the Local Government and Shires Association (LGSA) through support for the Cultural Awards, regular meetings with the Cultural Officer and attendance at functions. There was further contact with arts peak bodies including Museums and Galleries NSW, Music NSW, Accessible Arts NSW, Arts on Tour, Sydney Arts Management Advisory Group, Currency House and Screen NSW.

The Funding Manager sat on the ArtStart Advisory Committee for TAFE Training and Educational Support.

Federal Government

RANSW receives funding from the Department Environment, Water, Heritage and the Arts (DEWHA) through the Regional Arts Fund (RAF). Correspondence and copies of the Annual Report were sent to all MP's in regional electorates. Minister Peter Garrett was sent a copy of the publication 'Missing', a RAF funded project developed by SEAR in partnership with the CMA and the National Park. This publication used a local professional artist and writer to create a children's book identifying endangered species in the Snowy region and demonstrated the value of the RAF to enable a NSW project to be implemented successfully.

RAA

RANSW is represented on the board of the national body, Regional Arts Australia (RAA) by the Chair and the CEO. Following a strategic planning meeting at the Gold Coast in February, advocacy emerged as a key priority for the national body and the following activities were undertaken in response to this priority.

- 1. A round of meetings with Federal politicians in March at Parliament House in Canberra.
- 2. A new national consultation with regional communities to review and update the National Directions document published in 2005 and to provide data to develop new priorities to take to the Federal government. The project consisted of two face to face consultations with regional communities, including local government representatives, in each state, a meeting with non-arts regional peak bodies in each capital city and an on-line survey.
 - In NSW consultations were held at the National Theatre in Braidwood on 12 June with around 40 people from across the STARTS and SEAR regions, followed by an industry function at the Q Arts Centre in Queanbeyan with four of Queanbeyan's councillors attending. A second consultation was held in Bathurst on Tuesday 30 June and over 100 people from across the Central West of NSW attended including the member of the Blue Mountains, Bob Debus MP. The Sydney event was held on Monday 15 June in the Speakers Dining Room at Parliament House. Key representatives from the CWA, Volunteering NSW, NSW Council of Social Services and the Country branch of the NSW P & C Association met at a working lunch which explored common regional issues in advocacy to the Federal Government and opportunities to develop more strategic relationships with these bodies at a state level.
- 3. Publication of a new document that compiled the results of the national consultation, Creating a Better Life for Regional Australians.
- 4. Hosting a national forum in Canberra on 23 November attended by the Minister for the Arts, the Hon Peter Garrett AM, MP together with state and national arts agencies and peak bodies.

RANSW CEO delivered a presentation on the RAA/SBS communications partnership on behalf of RAA at the Regional Media Conference at ScreenSound Australia

Australia Council for the Arts

RANSW continued to strengthen its relationships with the Australia Council through meeting the terms of our funding agreement and through attendance at a national meeting of key service organisations in Melbourne, attendance at the Ros Bower Awards, ABaF Awards in Brisbane and the *Revealing the Arts Forum* co-hosted with the ABC at their studios in Ultimo. This forum explored the issues and opportunities faced by artists and arts organisations working in new digital mediums. The Australia Council announced two new funding programs, a 'Geek in Residence' pilot and a Digital Culture Fund' and the ABC announced new developments for the arts including arts broadcasts on ABC1 and ABC 2 as well as a more integrated online service newly branded ABC Arts. Included in this on line presence is the RAA/ABC partnership Artpost which is now featured as part of ABC Arts brand to give a greater prominence to regional artists.

Meetings were held with various officers to provide information about Indigenous research and development in NSW.

Australia Council for the Arts

The CEO of the Australia Council, Kathy Keele and the Director of ArtSupport Australia joined the CEO and the Arts OutWest RADO, Tracey Callinan on the road for a scheduled week long field trip through the Central West in December. The purpose of the trip was to give them a snapshot of the successes and challenges facing arts and cultural development in regional NSW. Major regional centres, small towns and remote communities were included in the itinerary.

ABaF

The Chair and the CEO attended the ABaF State Awards 10 September at Government House in Sydney when Werris Creek Rail Journeys Museum and Liverpool Plains Shire Council were presented with the Toyota Community Award for their work developing the Australian Railway Monument. A number of meetings were held with ABaF staff during the year to try to work through ways in which the organisation could work effectively in regional NSW through the RADO network.

Other Federal Government Agencies

The CEO and Funding Manager had meetings with DEWHA and FaHCSIA officers to share information regarding Aboriginal arts development in NSW.

Local Government

Across regional NSW councils are stakeholders in the Regional Arts Boards due to their financial contribution to the program. RANSW corresponds with Councils to advise them of state wide matters and the CEO regularly visits local government bodies during regional field trips. RANSW also maintains an ongoing relationship with the LGSA and presents an award at the annual LGSA Cultural Awards evening in Sydney. Local government is represented on the RANSW board.

CAPACITY BUILDING

Funding Programs

RANSW continued to administer two grants programs for supporting the arts in regional NSW, the NSW Government's Country Arts Support Program (CASP) and the Australian Government's Regional Arts Fund (RAF).

1. Country Arts Support Program & Prop Ups

CASP is an annual small grants program that supports community cultural development in regional NSW. Applications close in mid-February and successful applications are notified in late March. The funding pool is divided evenly across the 14 regions, 13 RABs and one covering local government areas that do not contribute to a RAB. Applications are assessed by regional panels. In 2009, 142 projects totalling \$205,012 were approved for a diverse range of arts activities which included opera, oral history, totems, textiles, screen printing, song writing, filmmaking and fire art. The funds available for this program continue to fall well short of the demand and this year 207 applications were received requesting a total amount of \$418,843.

The CASP also includes a limited amount for Prop Ups (quick response grants) which provides assistance for performing arts projects, such as a touring production, that become available at short notice and outside the annual funding round. Although some regions prefer to allocate their Prop Ups allocation to meet the high demand for CASP funds, 7 projects totalling \$5,100 were funded in 2009.

CAPACITY BUILDING

2. Regional Arts Fund: Community Grants & Quick Response Grants

In 2009 RAF entered into the second year of its four year funding agreement with the DEWHA. The Community Grants program is designed to support arts and cultural activities that are sustainable, have long term cultural, economic and social benefits, develop partnerships and cultural networks and provide skills development opportunities. Multi-year projects can be funded under this program.

During 2009, 22 RAF projects totalling \$326,214 were delivered, including the first year of two 3 year projects and three 2 year projects.

The funding round closed in August for projects commencing in 2010. There was an unprecedented response to the RAF with 91 applications received and 20 new projects funded totalling \$271,600, including the first year of one 3 year project and three 2 year projects. An additional \$97,160 was approved for the second year of the 5 multiple year projects.

The RAF also delivers the Quick Response Grants program for which \$10,000 is allocated to each quarter of the year. The Quick Response Grants program supports professional development for artists or skills or arts development for community projects and, in 2009, 36 projects totalling \$39,551 were funded.

Funding Development: Targeted Communities

This project is a RAF Strategic Initiative Project and aims to increase the number and quality of grant applications submitted by communities that currently do not access the RAF through building their capacity to be competitive. This project is managed by the Funding Manager and involves conducting Funding Workshops in specific communities across regional NSW targeted for assistance in consultation with the regional arts Network and on the basis of research into funding history.

In 2009 workshops were conducted by the Funding Manager and Funding Officer in Broken Hill, Northern Rivers (Grafton, Murwillumbah and Lismore), Inverell, Grenfell, South East (Moruya and Bega), Orana (Dunedoo and Narromine) and Griffith. 235 participants from approximately 60 regional communities attended and included artists in many different artforms, local government representatives, Cultural and Community Development workers, Health workers, Project Managers, Executive Officers, Administrators, Festival Directors, Event Managers, Committee members, Youth Workers, Gallery Owners, Business Managers.

Professional Development

Regional Arts NSW supported the inaugural The Art of Good Health and Wellbeing International Arts and Health Conference held in Port Macquarie, 10 – 13 November by promoting it through the website and e-bulletin and funding regional artists to attend through applications received for Quick Response Grants. This is a field that is growing and providing artists and arts organisations with new opportunities for projects and new audiences and it is significant that the first conference was held in the high growth Mid North Coast region of NSW.




COMMUNICATIONS & MARKETING

The monthly e-bulletin and the website are the main communication tools and content is continuously refined and updated.

- 11 monthly e-bulletins were transmitted during 2009 (Dec/Jan editions are combined)
- 3,548 subscribers now receive the e-bulletin, an increase of over 500 from the previous year.
- Website content is updated on an ongoing basis. A significant new section was the
 development of the Grants Section which was comprehensively extended to cover all
 grants programs available to the arts sector together with a two way search function, by
 title or by closing date. This has given the RABs the opportunity to link directly to the
 website without having to duplicate the information.
- The website now has a secure log-in for directors to access board papers and other documents and a similar facility is planned for RADOs.
- Two new sections have been created, one to feature great regional projects and the second to operate as a 'blog' to record regional travel. Population of these sections will take place in 2010.



- A new pull-up banner was made for use at public presentations and was used during the Arts + Health Conference in Port Macquarie and print material was distributed to conference attendees.
- An article on music in regional NSW was written and published in the June edition of the Australia Music Centre's Resonate journal.
- A back issue of ArtReach featuring music was supplied for distribution by Music NSW.
- A CD was developed with a presentation of project images that was looped continuously from a large screen at the DSRD stand Country & Regional Living Expo, 7- 9 August to promote arts activities in regional NSW
- The partnership with RAA and SBS resulted in a series of vignettes being developed and screened throughout the year nationally to both regional and metropolitan audiences. The NSW featured story was the work of 'fling physical Theatre in Bega. This promotion was very successful in raising the profile of RAA and RANSW.
- The CEO gave a number of regional radio and newspaper interviews during field trips.

SUPPORT & SERVICES

Financial Services

RANSW provides accounting and tax services, group insurance policies, and professional advice for the regional Network. In 2009 we lodged FBT returns for 5 regional boards, provided ongoing advice on various accounting and tax issues. We provided fleet management services for 4 vehicles. RABs were advised that this service would cease in 2010 as the fleet was now too small to gain any benefit and the leasing company would not renew any further leases when the current agreement expired.

All group insurance policies are under ongoing review to obtain the best outcomes for the network of regional arts bodies and arts organisations. Group public liability insurance now covers 65 regional arts organisations. In addition we manage group policies for association liability insurance for all regional arts boards, volunteers' personal accident and sickness insurance for 83 regional arts entities, property insurance for 7 regions and motor vehicle insurance for 5 vehicles. These group policies provide substantial savings for the participating organisations.

At the beginning of the financial year, the Finance Manager restructured the Company's chart of accounts so that management financial reports can be generated more efficiently and in a more relevant user-friendly format.

State - wide database project

The state wide database project has been continuing to expand during 2009 and will deliver substantial benefits to all regions when it is completed. It had been developed from the initial RANSW Grant Management System to incorporate an extensive integrated Customer Relationship Management System through a web based on line interface. There have been many issues to resolve to accommodate the diverse needs of the regional boards and we have consciously extended the initial timeframes to ensure that it is as effective and user friendly as possible.

As of February 2010, seven of the 13 Regional Arts Boards have imported their data to the system and have full access. The usage of these regions is being monitored and ranges from minor and sporadic information retrieval to fully blown replacement of all contact management systems. A discussion on the usage practices of various regions will take place at the next RADO meeting on 16 March, which will extend existing experience sharing between users and hopefully encourage a greater sense of ownership and improve usage practices.

An interesting step forward in the development of the database was made in late 2009 with an agreement being reached between RANSW and Arts OutWest to waive the initial access fee (\$2,000) in return for Arts OutWest co-investing in the development of a system to publish selected information fields stored within the database on their publicly available website. The work already done in this area will be expanded upon in the second stage of database development with an aim to creating a RANSW hosted series of web pages that will provide this web publication service to all Regional Arts Boards that are signed up to the database. This should provide an invaluable and easy-to-use web marketing tool for regional events and a search engine to locate artists, venues and arts organisations within a geographical area, all with no extra technological investment from the Regional Arts Boards.

Indigenous Arts Research Projects

In 2009 RANSW conducted two research projects on Indigenous arts in NSW.

The first project was undertaken between February and June with the assistance of funding from the Department of Education, Employment and Workplace Relations through the Emerging Indigenous Entrepreneur Initiative program. It involved research on economically sustainable Indigenous artists' ventures in NSW, including the mapping of existing Indigenous arts centres, art businesses and artists, exploring key market areas and researching relevant funding programs and services.

The second project received funding assistance from Arts NSW to conduct a training needs analysis and skills audit of Aboriginal artists and arts organisations in NSW. Much of this research relied on data collected through field trips with 33 towns visited over a six month period covering 11 of the 13 RABs plus groups in Illawarra / Shoalhaven and Griffith / Leeton.

A Research Officer was employed to carry out both projects.

ARC Linkage Grant: Cultural Asset Mapping

Cultural Asset Mapping for Planning and Development in Regional Australia (CAMRA) is a major, \$2.5 million Australian Research Council and industry funded project running from 2008 to 2013. RANSW is a partner in this project which aims to provide planners, policy-makers and communities in regional Australia with the knowledge they need to make better-informed planning decisions for more effective development of their local arts and cultural industries.

Highlights of the CAMRA asset mapping projects during 2009 included the following activities in Wollongong and the Central Darling shire. A series of successful mapping lounges around 'cool' and 'creative' Wollongong were undertaken. In November a team of CAMRA researchers (Chris Gibson, Andrew Warren and Ben Gallan from UOW; Lisa Andersen and Josh Edwards from UTS) staffed a stall at the Viva La Gong festival in Wollongong. Festival attendees were asked to spend a few minutes of their day to record their views on MP3 recorders about where 'cool' and 'creative' Wollongong was in their city and to draw on maps as they described in words where 'cool' and 'creative' Wollongong was in their minds. Over 160 people participated and there was a very positive reaction to this form of survey. The data is now being analysed.

Josh Edwards and Lisa Andersen spent 14 weeks building a database of people, places, activities and publications to assist them with mapping cultural assets - past and present - in the Central Darling Shire. They contacted (via telephone) a group of local people identified in their research to introduce them to the CAMRA project and ask them some questions about what they make and buy locally, where they take visitors and what inspires them about where they live. At the same time they built a Google Map based on their database to invite public inputs in the

online map, considering the intuitive/easy use of Google Maps for people from diverse educational backgrounds, categories and mapping icons that will enable local understanding and interaction with the online data and whether or not they need to develop specific iconography for the CAMRA Project to mark 'creative' and 'cool' places. This survey of community leaders in the Central Darling Shire has so far yielded some rich responses that have been plotted onto Google Maps.

During 2009 CAMRA and UTS Shopfront Community Program undertook a new development in partnership with Arts NSW, NSW Empty Spaces On-Line to be launched in 2010. Based on Renew Newcastle and European models the project will support artists, creative entrepreneurs and community organisations to find short and medium term uses for buildings in the CBDs and high streets of regional NSW that are currently vacant, disused, or awaiting redevelopment. The first stage will focus on Wollongong, Gosford and Parramatta and eventually will include all of regional NSW. Other project partners include Renew Newcastle, the Arts Law Centre of Australia and the NSW Department of Planning who will provide legal templates, guidelines and supporting documentation. The site will work alongside Arts NSW's new Creative Enterprise Hubs program and has many synergies with CAMRA and the potential to support local leadership for regional renewal and start-up creative and community enterprises.

Network Meetings

There were three, 2 day Network meetings for regional arts board staff members held 24 & 25 March, 28 & 29 July and 24 & 25 November. The March meeting was held at the Australia Council and included a three hour training session from Community Partnerships for all regional staff, a briefing session with Mary Darwell and Michelle Roberson from Arts NSW on the process for the next triennial funding agreement and a briefing session on insurance matters. The July meeting focussed on RADO business including working with local government, financial management, working with boards, communications, funding, regional events and creative industries. The November meeting was held at the Campbelltown Arts Centre to familiarise regional staff with the arts facilities in Western Sydney. After a tour of Campbelltown Arts Centre, they visited Casula Powerhouse and Blacktown Arts Centre and heard presentations from Parramatta City Council and Penrith Regional Arts Centres.

The annual national RADO meeting, supported by Regional Arts Australia, was held in Geelong on 1 October. Facilitated by Anne Dunn, the meeting discussed a number of matters to feed back in the Regional Arts Australia national agenda as well as giving an opportunity for networking and information exchange for the attendees from all states.

RANSW hosted an informal 'pub' dinner on 28 July for all regional staff to farewell RADOs Nina O'Brien Hehir and Angela Sidoti, to welcome new RANSW staff members, Elinor Heard and Ruben Allas and new RADO, Tracey Callinan (Arts OutWest), to the Network. Guests from Arts NSW, Hugo Leschen and Michael Goss also attended.

RADO Recruitment

The Network said farewell to three regional arts development officers this year. Angela Sidoti left Out Back Arts to return to Sydney, Nina O'Brien-Hehir left South West Arts to take up a new position in Deniliquin and Jack Ritchie left Arts North West to take up a newly created position as Local Employment Co-ordinator for the Hunter/Central Coast region. All three RADO's made enormous contributions their regions. Nina started in the network as the founding RADO Orana Arts then transferred to South West Arts. Jack served nearly 14 years as a RADO creating a record period of time in this very demanding position and left a significant legacy of achievement for Arts North West.

The new appointments for 2009 were Tracey Callinan (Arts OutWest), Alyce Fisher (South West Arts), Jamie-Lea Hodges (Out Back Arts) and Jane Kreis (Arts North West). The CEO worked with the Chairs and the boards, providing advice, developing recruitment schedules, ad copy, position descriptions, sample contracts as well as participating in the short listing process and sitting on the interview panels.

Regional Travel

There was a significant amount of regional travel undertaken this year by the CEO, Funding Manager and Officer and the Research Officer. The CEO continued to travel extensively to attend regional board meetings, meet with regional councils and arts organisations and to attend events to provide support for the regional staff and regional arts boards. Extended field trips were also scheduled to gain more in depth knowledge of individual regions. There was additional travel by the Chair and CEO to fulfil their responsibilities as Directors of the Board of Regional Arts Australia.

MANAGEMENT & GOVERNANCE

Board Matters

A new structure for Regional Arts NSW was adopted at an Extraordinary General Meeting in Sydney on 2 July 2009.

Regional Arts NSW is constituted as a Company Limited by Guarantee, and up to that date the members of the Company were the Directors, generally the Chairs of each Regional Arts Board (or their nominee), plus additional co-opted members. At the EGM on 2 July the membership basis of the organisation changed, and the Regional Arts Boards, as entities, became the members of the company.

The Chairs of each RAB (or their nominees) now act as an Advisory Council that meets annually to provide strategic and policy direction and advocacy priorities to a 9 member Board of Directors who will undertake the implementation of those directions and the governance of RANSW on their behalf. The Advisory Council will appoint 5 regional directors and there are four additional positions on the board for co-opted members to complement the skills mix of the regional directors.

To implement this change to the structure of the organisation RANSW followed a process of consultation and deliberation.

To fully meet the requirements of the Corporations Act a new Constitution was developed and adopted. Acting on the legal advice of Director, Calum Henderson, the constitution was completely redrafted with considerable pro bono support from Deacons Lawyers (now Norton Rose).

The new Board meets at least five times per year rather than three. The new constitution was formally adopted at the EGM on 2 July and all reporting and advice to all relevant government bodies including ASIC, ATO, ROCO and the NSW Office of Charities was completed and accepted. Minutes and reports are circulated to all Members (RABs) together with a newsletter from the Chair following each Board meeting.

- Received a one-off increase of \$45,000 for the 2010 CASP round plus \$2,000 in assistance for the November RADO meeting.

Australia Council

Completed the second of the three year agreement with the Australia Council under Community Partnerships as a key service organisation.

DEEWR

Completed the state wide research project on Indigenous arts centre development. The project, entitled Identification of Economic Engagement Opportunities in the Indigenous Arts Industry in NSW, funded by the Department Education, Employment and Workplace Relations (DEEWR) was delivered in June, 2009.

Corporate information

The financial report of Regional Arts NSW Ltd (the company) for the year ended 31 December 2009 was authorised for issue in accordance with a resolution of the directors on 4 March 2010.

Regional Arts NSW Ltd (the parent) is a charitable company settled and domiciled in Australia. The nature of the operations and principal activities of the company and its controlled entity are described in the Directors' Report.

2 Statement of significant accounting policies

(a) Basis of preparation

The financial report is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards (including Australian Accounting Interpretations) and the *Corporations Act 2001*.

Australian Accounting Standards set out accounting policies that the AASB has concluded would result in a financial report containing relevant and reliable information about transactions, events and conditions. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of this financial report are presented below and have been consistently applied unless otherwise stated.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

(b) Significant accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of policies and reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other various factors that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances, the results of which form the basis of making the judgements. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

Significant accounting judgements

The company has entered into leases of premises as disclosed in Note 16. Management has determined that all of the risks and rewards of ownership of these premises remain with the lessor and has therefore classified the leases as operating leases.

(b) Significant accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions continued

Significant accounting estimates and assumptions

The key estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing material adjustment to the carrying amount of certain assets and liabilities within the next annual reporting period are:

Make good provisions

Provisions for future costs to return certain leased premises to their original condition are based on the parent entity's past experience with similar premises and estimates of likely restoration costs determined by the parent entity's property manager. These estimates may vary from the actual costs incurred as a result of conditions existing at the date the premises are vacated.

Provision for employee benefits

Provisions for employee benefits payable after 12 months from the reporting date are based on future wage and salary levels, experience of employee departures, and periods of service, as discussed in Note 2 (j). The amount of these provisions would change should any of the employees change in the next 12 months.

(c) Revenue recognition

Revenue is recognised when the consolidated entity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. Revenues are recognised net of the amounts of goods and services tax (GST) payable to the Australian Taxation Office.

Revenue from fundraising

Donations

Donations are recognised when received.

Revenue from operating activities

Government funding

Grant revenue is recognised in the income statement when the consolidated entity obtains control of the grant and it is probable that the economic benefits gained from the grant will flow to the consolidated entity and the amount of the grant can be measured reliably.

If conditions are attached to the grant which must be satisfied before it is eligible to receive the contribution, the recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are met.

When grant revenue is received whereby the consolidated entity incurs an obligation to deliver economic value directly back to the contributor, this is considered a reciprocal transaction, and the grant revenue is recognised in the balance sheet as a liability until the service has been delivered to the contributor, otherwise the grant is recognised as income on receipt.

Investment income

Investment income comprises of interest and dividends. Interest income is recognised as it accrues using the effective interest method.

Asset sales

The gain or loss on disposal of all non-current assets is determined as the difference between the carrying amount of the asset at the time of the disposal and the net proceeds on disposal.

(d) Expenditure

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to that category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to a particular category they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Fundraising costs are those incurred on seeking voluntary contributions by donation and do not include costs of disseminating information relating to the activities carried on by the consolidated entity.

(e) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents in the balance sheet comprise cash at bank and in hand and short-term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less. For the purposes of the cash flow statement, cash and cash equivalents consist of cash and cash equivalents as defined above, net of any outstanding bank overdrafts.

(f) Trade and other receivables

Trade receivables, which comprise amounts due from services provided, are recognised and carried at original invoice amount less an allowance for any uncollectable amounts. Normal terms of settlement are usually within 30 days. The notional amount of the receivable is deemed to reflect fair value.

An allowance for doubtful receivables is made when there is objective evidence that the consolidated entity will not be able to collect the debts. Bad debts are written off when identified.

(g) Plant and equipment

Bases of measurement of carrying amount

Plant and equipment is stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses.

Any plant and equipment donated to the consolidated entity or acquired for nominal cost is recognised at fair value at the date the consolidated entity obtains control of the assets.

Depreciation

Items of plant and equipment are depreciated over their useful lives to the consolidated entity commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Depreciation is calculated on a straight line basis over the expected useful economic lives of the assets as follows:

(g) Plant and equipment continued

Impairment

The carrying values of plant and equipment are reviewed for impairment at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated when events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value may be impaired.

The recoverable amount of plant and equipment is the higher of fair value less costs to sell and value in use. Depreciated replacement cost is the current replacement cost of an item of plant and equipment less, where applicable, accumulated depreciation to date, calculated on the basis of such cost.

Impairment exists when the carrying value of an asset exceeds its estimated recoverable amount. The asset is then written down to its recoverable amount.

For plant and equipment, impairment losses are recognised in the income statement.

Derecognition and disposal

An item of plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal, when the item is no longer used in the operations of the consolidated entity or when it has no sale value. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included in profit or loss in the year the asset is derecognised.

(h) Trade creditors and other payables

Trade payables and other payables represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the consolidated entity prior to the end of the financial period that are unpaid. These amounts are usually settled in 30 days. The notional amount of the payables is deemed to reflect fair value.

(i) Deferred income

The liability for deferred income is the unutilised amounts of grants received on the condition that specified services are delivered or conditions are fulfilled. The services are usually provided or the conditions usually fulfilled within 12 months of receipt of the grant. When the amount received is in respect of services to be provided over a period that exceeds 12 months after the reporting date or the conditions will only be satisfied more than 12 months after the reporting date, the liability is discounted.

(j) Employee benefits

Employee benefits comprise wages and salaries, annual, non-accumulating sick and long service leave, and contributions to superannuation plans.

Liabilities for wages and salaries expected to be settled within 12 months of balance date are recognised in other payables in respect of employees' services up to the reporting date. Liabilities for annual leave in respect of employees' services up to the reporting date which are expected to be settled within 12 months of balance date are recognised in the provision for annual leave. Both liabilities are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled. Liabilities for non-accumulating sick leave are recognised when the leave is taken and are measured at the rates paid or payable.

The liability for long service leave is recognised in the provision for employee benefits and measured as the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date using the projected unit credit method. Consideration is given to anticipated future wage and salary levels, experience of employee departures, and periods of service. Expected future payments are discounted using market yields at the reporting date on national government bonds with terms to maturity and currencies that match, as closely as possible, the estimated future cash outflows.

The company pays contributions to certain defined contribution superannuation plans. Contributions are recognised in the income statement when they are due. The parent entity has no obligation to pay further contributions to these plans if the plans do not hold sufficient assets to pay all employee benefits relating to employee service in current and prior periods.

(k) Leased assets and liabilities

Operating leases

Operating lease payments are recognised as an expense in the income statement on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

(I) Taxation

Income tax

The parent entity and its controlled entity are both charitable institutions for the purposes of Australian taxation legislation and are therefore exempt from income tax. This exemption has been confirmed by the Australian Taxation Office. The parent entity and its controlled entity both hold deductible gift recipient status.

(I) Taxation continued

Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office, in which case it is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of expense.

Receivables and payables are recognised inclusive of GST.

The net amount of GST recoverable from or payable to the Australian Taxation Office is included as part of receivables or payables.

Cash flows are included in the statement of cash flows on a gross basis. The GST component of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which is recoverable or payable to the Australian Taxation Office is classified as operating cash flows.

(m) New accounting standards and interpretations

The consolidated entity has adopted new and amended Australian Accounting Standards and AASB Interpretations as of 1 January 2009. Amendments resulting from these new and amended Australian Accounting Standards and AASB Interpretations did not and are not expected to have any impact on the accounting policies, financial position or performance of the consolidated entity except for:

AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements (revised 2007) effective 1 January 2009

Revised AASB 101 *Presentation of Financial Statements* (2007) became mandatory for the consolidated entity's financial report for the year ending 31 December 2009. The revised AASB 101 introduces the term 'total comprehensive income' which is defined as the change in equity during a period resulting from transactions other than those changes resulting from transactions with owners in their capacity as owners. It also allows for the presentation of total comprehensive income in either a single statement of comprehensive income or in an income statement and a separate statement of comprehensive income. The consolidated entity has elected to present the single statement format.

(n) Going concern

The financial report has been prepared on a going concern basis, which contemplates continuity of normal trading activities and the realisation of assets and settlement of liabilities in the normal course of business. The company's continued existence is ultimately dependent upon the success of future productions and government support.

If the company is unable to continue as a going concern it may be required to realise its assets and extinguish its liabilities other than in the normal course of business and in amounts different from those stated in the financial report.

At the date of the report, the parent entity has received notification that 2010 grant funding has been approved and it is expected the parent entity will be able to continue in its normal capacity.


