What is the Indigenous Arts Leadership Program (the Program), supported by Wesfarmers Arts?

The National Gallery of Australia's <u>Indigenous Arts Leadership Program</u>, supported by <u>Wesfarmers Arts</u> is a professional development opportunity, which brings together a mixed cohort of national First Nations arts workers who are ready to reflect on their skills, capabilities and what leadership means to them individually.

The Program supports First Nations arts workers to deepen their understanding of the creative sector and build their network of support. This unique opportunity aims to nurture individuals as their careers progress.

The Program is run by the National Gallery and is supported by Wesfarmers Arts as part of their commitment to First Nations leadership in the arts.

Residential One: in Wiradjuri Country at Wagga Wagga (NSW) Thursday 31 March

Wednesday 6 April 2022.

Residential Two: in Ngunnawal/Ngambri Country at Canberra (ACT) Thursday 26 May – Thursday 2 June 2022.

Graduation: Evening of Thursday 2 June 2022.

Who is the Indigenous Arts Leadership Program for?

First Nations arts workers who are at various stages of their careers. The Program attracts learners who are open to new ideas, able to learn in a group situation and willing to share knowledge and insights with others, and participants who understand their leadership responsibilities and want to learn more about themselves and their communities.

What is a Residential?

A Residential is a six- to seven-day intensive experience that may take place in-person, online or hybrid, depending on COVID-19 restrictions at the time of the Residential.

The Program is designed and led by the <u>Wesfarmers Indigenous Arts Leadership</u>

<u>Program Coordinator</u> and guided by the <u>Elder-in-Residence</u>, responding to the needs of the cohort.

Each Residential provides a time and space for the group to connect, collaborate, listen, and hear from Elders, community, key guest speakers, Alumni and National Gallery staff.





How much does the Indigenous Arts Leadership Program cost?

Wesfarmers Arts and the National Gallery of Australia support participants to undertake the Program.

All costs are covered by the Program, except the cost of getting you to and from your home to airport.

We'll look after everything else for you, including On Country learning, facilitation and guest speakers, your accommodation, ground transport, program resources and all meals for the duration of the Residentials.

Do I have to pay for accommodation or food at the Residentials?

The Program will cover these costs for all participants. We will accommodate you for the length of the Residential and will cover the cost of your breakfast, lunch, and dinner during this time. Additional extras (such as espresso coffee and mini-bar items) are at your own expense.



'The Program was focused on the importance of sharing and solidarity. Participants showed unity and respect. Residential Two continued focusing on Yindyamarra which underpinned the Program. The highlight was being out on Country, developing relationships with people. Our culture is based on relationships with people, plants, Country and each other. We were fed, we were worked, we learnt and we

still had time to reflect.'

"Being the Elder in Residence for Residential One in Wagga Wagga (Wiradjuri) and Residential Two in ACT (Ngunnawal) – I took on this role with great respect. It was amazing to be available to offer a very warm and welcoming environment on the lands of my people, with my connection to both Countries and communities.

From the Residential One to the Graduation in Residential Two, I witnessed participants learning and saw huge transformation and growth in all of them. The community in Wiradjuri Country, Wagga Wagga are looking forward to the return of this Program soon."
